

Subject: COMMUNITY CHEST 2017/2018

1. <u>Executive Summary</u>

This report advises the Mayor of two applications for funding from the Community Chest and requests a decision regarding the funding, if any, to be awarded.

2. Recommendation(s)

The Mayor is requested to consider two applications for financial assistance which are summarised at Appendix B and, if satisfied, to determine the sum, if any, to be awarded up to the maximum of £1,000 in accordance with the agreed Community Chest criteria.

3. Reasons for Recommendations

To enable consideration to be given to supporting an application for financial assistance from voluntary, community or charitable organisations working locally which provide services that benefit Bedford Borough residents.

4. Key Issues

4.1 Legal Issues

The Council must have the power to provide grant funding to the organisation concerned. A source of power for payments to "voluntary organisations" (which are defined to be "a body which is not a public body but whose activities are carried on otherwise than for profit") and to charitable bodies (in furtherance of their work in the United Kingdom) is s.137 of the Local Government Act 1972. A further source of power is of the Localism Act 2011.

Criteria for the award of grants from the Community Chest fund have been established by the Grants Committee over a number of years and are reproduced at **Appendix A**.

4.2 Policy Issues

The criteria for the award of grants to voluntary, community and charitable organisations from the Community Chest (shown at Appendix A to this report) were approved by Members at the meeting of the Grants Committee on 3 March 2011.

4.3 Resource Implications

The Council's agreed revenue budget for 2017/2018 includes a budget for the award of Community Chest grants. There are two applications for funding for consideration set out in this report for a total sum of £2,000 and there are sufficient funds remaining to meet this amount should it be awarded.

4.4 Risk Implications

There is a risk to the Council's reputation if the process for allocation of grants is not seen to be conducted in a fair and transparent manner. There is also a small risk that a legal challenge could be made against the Council under, for example, equalities legislation. This risk is mitigated through previous consultation undertaken with the third sector which was considered by the Grants Committee at its meeting of 14 March 2012 and the established criteria and application process for the Community Chest which was approved by the Grants Committee at the meeting of 3 March 2011.

4.5 Environmental Implications

No adverse environmental implications have been identified as arising from the project for which funding is sought.

4.6 Equality Analysis

In preparing this report, due consideration has been given to the Borough Council's statutory Equality Duty as set out in Section 149(1) of the Equality Act 2010, to have due regard to the need to;

- (a) eliminate discrimination, harassment, victimisation and any other conduct that is prohibited by or under this Act;
- (b) advance equality of opportunity between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it;
- (c) foster good relations between persons who share a relevant protected characteristic and persons who do not share it.

A detailed equality analysis regarding the Council's arrangements for consideration of grant applications was considered by the Executive on 7 December 2011. This analysis shows that the organisations supported through third sector grants and community chest awards provide services to persons with protected characteristics and, therefore, there is the potential for changes to the level of support provided to organisation to adversely affect persons in protected groups.

A relevance test for equality has been completed in respect of the recommendations made in this report. The equality test determined that since there are no proposals to change the processes or guidelines for the award of grants that the activity has no relevance to Bedford Borough Council's statutory equality duty to eliminate unlawful discrimination, advance equality of opportunity and foster good relation. An equality analysis is not needed.

The Mayor is requested to consider the applications shown at **Appendices B & C** having regard to the approved criteria, which are shown at **Appendix A**.

- Be a voluntary, charitable organisation or community group providing services and activities for Bedford Borough residents.
 Applications cannot be accepted from individuals or party political groups;
- Be known to the council through partnership working or be able to demonstrate that it can develop a relationship with the council or has borough councillor representative(s) on its management committee;
- o Be a not for profit organisation;
- Have a constitution, set of rules or memorandum and articles of association with clear aims and objectives which support the council
 in the goals outlined in the Corporate Plan and the Sustainable Community Strategy;

- Have formal financial arrangements with accounts which are not more than 12 months old and (audited with certificate or verified by a suitable competent person independent of the organisation). Organisations which have been in existence for less than one year can provide a forecast of income and expenditure signed by the chairperson and the treasurer;
- o Have a bank or building society account in the name of the organisation with at least two unrelated signatories;
- Have an equal opportunities policy;
- o Have a child protection policy/vulnerable adult policy if the organisation works with or for young people/vulnerable adults;
- o Provide a report and simple statistics on service provision/progress of the project to the deadlines set by the Council;

We are passionate about helping the most disadvantaged in our society by restoring dignity and self-worth to the homeless which encourages responsibility and choice. We support over 500 beneficiaries each year through our holistic services including; weekly free hot meals, community and signposting in the town centre (Friday Night Meeting), Skills for Life Training Courses for independent living and employment, two support hostels, an 18 bed Night shelter, refugee support work and a rough sleeper outreach service to engage with homeless beneficiaries who struggle to access other services.'
Q15b	Expected outcomes of the organisation's current and planned activity(ies) and how they will be monitored	'We believe in building people into a community where they feel safe and are resourced to contribute. Through this project: Beneficiaries are offered healthy food and a safe environment where they can chat and share about issues affecting their lives. We can support beneficiaries who are not accessing the right services or who have run out of options for where to turn to help. Our Rough Sleep Outreach Worker works with individuals by supporting, advocating and signposting to address their exclusion and take the next steps in their life. Beneficiaries will sign up to the various Skills for Life courses and sports activities, leading to increased confidence and self-esteem. We will therefore achieve the following objectives; 2,000 visitors will come to our Friday Night Meeting, enabling us to provide free healthy meals and support to move away from homelessness. 250 rough sleepers will receive a safe place to sleep through our Night shelter and all will receive a hot meal, clean clothes, a shower and dedicated support to address their homelessness. Up to 40 beneficiaries each year will receive support in Barton House (our 14 bed move-on hostel) where individuals can stay for up to 2 years to work through the issues that led to their homelessness with the help of designated support workers. At least 100 clients will attend our courses and will enhance their employability skills, gain confidence, self-esteem and develop teambuilding skills. Homeless clients will be placed into work placements, significantly improving their prospects for paid employment. Beneficiaries will feel a sense of self-value, have a much greater chance of sustaining tenancies and will more easily be able to integrate into society. The success of this project will be measured in the following ways: We keep a record of how many people attend our services and receive meals each

week.

- We will monitor client referrals to external services and will monitor the uptake of these, whilst working with partners to improve accessibility.
- Our Rough Sleeper Outreach Worker will measure success through client feedback, move on rates, feedback from other organisations and by recording a breakdown of clients they work with.
- We will implement the Outcome Star for clients on our courses. This highlights 'distance travelled' and helps clients evaluate their skills, competencies and progress over time. This helps clients to identify and understand change, enabling them to celebrate success and understand which areas need development.
- We monitor attendances on our courses through course registers. We will also assess clients on skills based courses and provide certification for accredited courses.
- We will keep work placement logs for each client on a work placement to monitor the success of their placement. We will also monitor placements regularly and will request formal feedback at least every six months to ensure success.
- We receive feedback from clients, volunteers and other stakeholders, to understand the success and to implement future improvements.'

SUMMARY OF ORGANISATION'S ELIGIBILTY

How will the funding requested assist the Council in the delivery of the Sustainable Community Strategy?

'The project will have an impact upon all the priorities highlighted within the Council's Sustainable Community Plan. I will address this against each priority:

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, REGENERATION & ENTERPRISE: Clients will receive access to our Pathways to Employment programme which has already

seen over 50% of clients who have completed a work placement, move into employment. As a result of the support we provide, we have seen clients move on to set up their own businesses including car mechanics, bakeries and recycling. Your support will enable individuals who have fallen upon hard times, receive the support to address the barriers to participation and achieve their aspirations.

ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE CHANGE:

This project brings together clients into a safe, welcoming environment. To achieve this, we work together with local supermarkets to receive surplus food which reduces waste considerably. Providing food in an indoor environment for homeless clients enables us to use food efficiently, dispose of waste correctly and recycle wherever possible.

ADULT HEALTH AND WELLBEING:

A recent health audit survey from Homeless Link (2014) highlights the negative health impact as a result of homelessness. This includes 73% of homeless people reporting physical health

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			problems, 80% experiencing a mental health issue and 35% not eating at least two meals a day. This project will enable us to address these issues by developing community, building friendships, providing healthy nutritious meals and providing access to health facilities. Our Night shelter in particular, provides opportunities for members of the homeless community to receive a drop in from a local GP. CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE: Our services are open to young people over the age of 18 and support a considerable number of people under 25 years old. Our Night shelter last year supported 10.4% of this client group and our Pathways to Employment programme supported 44%. Our Friday Night Meeting programme also supports many parents with young children. Our support enables us to engage with young people or parents, enabling us to provide support to make good decisions, care for others and live independently. SAFER COMMUNITIES:
			King's Arms Project believes in the strength of community; That no one should face homelessness alone and that wider society is part of the solution. This project is therefore supported by over 40 different volunteers and a wide range of business partners. We have seen clients go onto to become pioneers of social development and champions of the community. This includes clients who have gone on to set up their own businesses, and others who lead support services for the homeless in Bedford. We believe in building people into a community where they feel safe and are resourced to contribute. We believe that we all have a role to play and that we must stand against poverty together. We believe that this is an important component for building confident communities and ensuring that those going through rough times have a place to meet friends and find a listening ear. This has a positive impact upon breaking the cycle of crime by developing safer communities, providing opportunities for training and qualification, and finding a way out of poverty. SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES: This Project will enable us to address the support and accommodation needs of our clients, with the aim for them to be financially independent and within accommodation of their own. We have seen 84% of clients from our move on housing project move into employment and have seen countless others moving into jobs.'

We work in partnership throughout the voluntary and statutory sectors to provide a coordinated approach to address homelessness and exclusion. We are the only provider of a Night shelter in Bedford and our services are often at full capacity, meeting a need that is too great for one provider to meet alone. This includes: Chairing the 'Bedfordshire Supported Housing Forum', an independent Multiagency forum to provide a coordinated approach to reducing homelessness, addressing needs and sharing best practice. Offering our Pathways to Employment programme to clients of all other projects supporting the homeless. Working alongside Pre Bend Day Centre who complements our Night shelter by providing daytime support and food to clients. We have also worked alongside Noah Enterprise who provided outreach work to the homeless, however, recent funding cuts now mean that we are the only provider of this service in Bedford. Working alongside the Salvation Army who provides shelter to residents on cold nights who cannot stay in our Night shelter due to capacity reasons. We also provide courses in their centre to support more homeless clients. Working alongside Amicus Trust, YMCA Bedfordshire and Emmaus to both refer clients and receive referrals for clients who cannot be supported. This enables us to innovatively respond to emerging challenges. We have therefore set up a refugee support fund for displaced Syrian Refugees and are beginning to support those with no recourse to public funds (45% of the total rough sleeper count).'

		We believe that there is no such thing as a hopeless case; That no one is too entrenched in poverty of any kind that they are beyond help. Throughout our work, we ensure that nobody faces homeless alone and that wider society is part of the solution. We believe in providing opportunity; that everyone deserves the chance to advance themselves and see their dreams realised. To this end, so far we have seen 56% of people rough sleeping directly move into their own accommodation. We have also seen 50% of our Pathways to Employment volunteer placement clients move into employment of their own. We will continue to advocate and support our clients to access these opportunities. FOSTER GOOD RELATIONS: This project brings together clients and volunteers from a wide range of ages and ethnic backgrounds. Throughout this, we have seen cross cultural/generational friendships develop and support networks increase. This has also led to previous clients moving on to volunteer

Up to 40 beneficiaries each year will receive support in Barton House and The Hub where individuals can stay for up to 2 years to work through the issues that led to their homelessness with the help of designated support workers. 2,000 visitors will come to our Friday Night Meeting, enabling us to provide free healthy meals, community and support for clients to move away from homelessness. 100 homeless/recently homeless beneficiaries will attend our Skills for Life courses and will enhance their employability skills, gain confidence and self-esteem and develop teambuilding skills. 25 homeless clients will be placed into work placements, significantly improving their prospects for paid employment. Purpose for which funding is requested:

'King's Arms Project has supported thousands of homeless clients in Bedford since we started in 1989.

Over the next year, we are planning to support over 500 clients through move on housing, hostel accommodation, our Night shelter, rough sleeper engagement work, refugee support work, independence/employability courses and our Friday Night drop in (Friday Night Meeting). With over 25 years of experience in working with the homeless in Bedford, we are in an exceptional position to assist those who are homeless and we have a track record of seeing our clients move away from life controlling addictions and into lives they are able to control and feel proud of.

The rough sleeper count in Bedford is higher than it's ever been, with the highest rates outside of London. We have witnessed first-hand ourselves how the number is rising with record numbers of people accessing our services.

We are asking if the Bedford Community Chest Fund will help us to provide support to enable us to provide meals to over 300 clients in Bedfordshire over the next year.

This includes providing up to 30,000 meals through Friday Night Meeting, Barton House and our Night shelter. This enables us to engage with our clients, provide healthy nutritious meals, relieve poverty and develop community through trusted relationships. This provides a base from which we can identify further support needs to our clients and signpost to relevant support agencies, activities and services. This income is fully reliant upon donations. This project will cost a total of £32,722, of which we have already secured £19,000, along with in kind support from Morrison's, Marks and Spencer's and Waitrose. We are asking if you will consider support us with a grant of £1,000 which will enable us to provide at least 917 meals.

We provide not only healthy food, but also a safe environment for people to sit a chat, often sharing issues affecting their lives. The project is supported by a fantastic group of up to 40 committed volunteers each year, made up of a variety of people with different ages, backgrounds and personalities. This includes previous service users who themselves know what it is like to be homeless or isolated, and now come along to meet, serve and support those currently in that situation. As well as providing food, friendship and support, a key function is the 'signposting' to other support services and medical help that is available locally. This includes offering support through our Rough Sleepers Outreach Worker who works together with our clients to give the best support they need to take the next step in their life. This enables us to address a wide range of needs, from the practical issue of sleeping rough, to long term emotional issues, and lack of any real community. Beneficiaries are also encouraged to sign up to our Skills for Life courses which includes employability courses, work placements, IT training, cookery and sports activities. "I have realised what life is; it's more than drinking and being on the streets. Friday Night Meeting is friendly, and people talk to you. I have gotten my confidence back."

What will happen to the service or project if this funding is not awarded? Does the organisation have a contingency plan?

'We would therefore need to invest more time into securing funds from elsewhere, using up spare resources which could otherwise have been used to support more clients. Partial funding could therefore have a proportional impact upon our outcomes. We would also be restricted in the time that we can invest into developing plans for a social enterprise which would otherwise develop financial sustainability.'

Would a grant from this Council help the organisation to secure match/lever funding? If yes, how much would it help to secure and from which organisation?

'Yes, A number of trusts require us to how have secured a percentage of match-funding before they will consider supporting us. In particular Bernard Sunley Foundation has recently required us to secure match funding before they will release funding. This has also been the case with Bedfordshire Volunteering Fund. Your support will provide much needed support to our clients and will provide a greater support base from which we can secure funding from elsewhere. This will also particularly help as we relaunch our regular giving campaign and develop our work with local companies.'

How has the organisation effectively demonstrated that there is a need for this service or project?

[Have they have provided details of research, surveys, consultation or evidence of current demand?]

"In England, more than 81,000 households were found to be homeless during 2013/14" (DCLG, 2014). Locally, the rough sleeper count in Bedford is higher than it's ever been, increasing from 26 to 51 last year. This combined with an increase in demand for our services, led to a record 500 clients being supported last year.

This includes rough sleepers, homeless beneficiaries, people struggling with addictions, exoffenders, the unemployed and soon, refugees. As a result of providing our range of holistic support services we are able to develop relationships with our beneficiaries, providing hope and dedicated support. This is important as the 'Places of Change' agenda has encouraged homelessness services to focus on moving service users forward, including improving their access to meaningful occupation and employment opportunities. Our Friday Night Meeting and other projects enable us to provide the highly important missing elements for homeless/vulnerable individuals by way of "security, privacy, and links to a community and support network" (Shelter, 2015).

Our aim is to see homeless clients back into independent accommodation and employment, and confident in basic life-skills, thus preventing recurring homelessness (Homeless Link, 2015).

The number of people accessing our services is the highest we have ever seen, and we firmly

		believe that assisting our clients into paid employment is the long-term solution to enhanced self-esteem, personal accommodation, and ending the cycle of homelessness. It is our mission to see lives restored and making it possible for those who have experienced difficulties to get back on their feet, whether that is rough-sleepers, ex-offenders or simply those who have fallen on hard times. We believe that what we have to offer is unique, carries excellent success rates, and our bespoke training courses are meeting a critical need in Bedford not being met by any other agencies or local authorities.'

To assist local people in understanding their contribution to greenhouse gas emissions and to identify specific courses of action to reduce participants' lifestyle's greenhouse emissions.

Our target group is Bedford Borough residents, eight people per six 2 hour workshop. They measure their carbon footprint via the Carbon Conversations online tool prior to the course and we will follow up after the course to determine how successful participants were in undertaking the necessary actions.

To provide two new trained local facilitators who can further the aims of Caron Conversations in Bedford Borough and deliver further workshops.

Providing reliable, well-researched information and practical guidance on what will make a difference to local people's carbon emissions and also providing support in creating a detailed personal plan for change. There is also crucially time to work through the conflicts between intention, social pressure and identity. The meetings use professionally designed, reliable materials to cover climate change basics, ideas for a low-carbon future and the four key areas of the footprint – home energy, travel, food and other consumption. Typically 10% of participants train to become facilitators of further groups, so increasing positive outcomes elsewhere inside and outside Bedford Borough.

How do you know that there is a need for your work/activity?Tell us how you have identified there is a need for your service or activity, giving details of any research, surveys or consultation you have undertaken o evidence of current demand.

Current BCCF members, as well as local people we speak to at local events and on our stalls, tell us of the need for individuals to be supported in their carbon reduction efforts. Our attendance at a well-attended recent local talk by George Marshall, author of Don't Even Think About It: Why Our Brains Are Wired To Ignore Climate Change, provided further evidence of this need to encourage an active dialogue about low carbon-living for the 21st century, overcoming the personal obstacles to lifestyle change.

Please show here how your work/activity will assist in supporting the Council's Sustainable Community Plan priorities:

Carbon reductions of 3 tonnes of CO2 are typically made by each member during the course, with plans developed to halve individual footprints over a 4-5 year period. The intention is also that participants share what they have learnt about low-carbon living with family, friends and colleagues so that their actions may encourage and support the necessary behaviour changes in others to reduce their greenhouse gas emissions too.

How does your request for a grant from public funds represent value for money for council tax payers?

Manmade climate change is one of the greatest threats to mankind and to the planet, and the potential financial costs of both mitigation and of dealing with its wideranging effects are considerable, locally and nationally. (Flooding, drought, crop failure etc) Assisting the residents of Bedford Borough to recognise the part they play and to undertake the concrete changes needed are a crucial part of tackling climate change. The fact that on average 10% of the course participants are likely to go on to later train as course facilitators themselves will mean a valuable 'cascade effect'. In addition many of the potential carbon reduction actions that follow from participation in the course will also mean personal

savings in terms of travel costs, energy expenditure, waste reduction etc, many of which will benefit the Borough in a broader sense too.

Our events and activities are publicised widely, through social media, our website, local press, churches and faith groups, charities and schools in order to try to appeal to absolutely all sectors of the community, regardless of gender, sexuality, faith, ethnicity and disability. There is no cost to attend most of our events, we just ask for donations where necessary. We warmly welcome new members and volunteers. Climate change effects us all and we believe that tackling this growing threat has the potential to unite people from many different groups in a common aim.

King's Arms Project have supported thousands of homeless clients in Bedford since we started in 1989. Over the next year, we are planning to support over 500 clients through move on housing, hostel accommodation, our Nightshelter, rough sleeper engagement work, refugee support work, independence/employability courses and our Friday Night drop in (Friday Night Meeting). With over 25 years of experience in working with the homeless in Bedford, we are in an exceptional position to assist those who are homeless and we have a track record of seeing our clients move away from life controlling addictions and into lives they are able to control and feel proud of.

The rough sleeper count in Bedford is higher than it's ever been, with the highest rates outside of London. We have witnessed first-hand ourselves how the number is rising with record numbers of people accessing our services.

We are asking if the Bedford Community Chest Fund will help us to provide support to enable us to provide meals to over 300 clients in Bedfordshire over the next year. This includes providing up to 30,000 meals through Friday Night Meeting, Barton House and our Nightshelter. This enables us to engage with our clients. provide healthy nutritious meals, relieve poverty and develop community through trusted relationships. This provides a base from which we can identify further support needs to our clients and signpost to relevant support agencies, activities and services. This income is fully reliant upon donations. This project will cost a total of £32,722, of which we have already secured £19,000, along with in kind support from Morrisons, Marks and Spencers and Waitrose. We are asking if you will consider support us with a grant of £1,000 which will enable us to provide at least 917 meals.

We provide not only healthy food, but also a safe environment for people to sit a chat, often sharing issues affecting their lives. The project is supported by a fantastic group of up to 40 committed volunteers each year, made up of a variety of people with different ages, backgrounds and personalities. This includes previous service users who themselves know what it is like to be homeless or isolated, and now come along to meet, serve and support those currently in that situation.

As well as providing food, friendship and support, a key function is the 'signposting' to other support services and medical help that is available locally. This includes offering support through our Rough Sleepers Outreach Worker who works together with our clients to give the best support they need to take the next step in their life. This enables us to address a wide range of needs, from the practical issue of sleeping rough, to long term emotional issues, and lack of any real community. Beneficiaries are also encouraged to sign up to our Skills for Life courses which includes employability courses, work placements, IT training, cookery and sports activities.

"I have realised what life is; it's more than drinking and being on the streets. Friday Night Meeting is friendly, and people talk to you. I have gotten my confidence back."

- We can support beneficiaries who are not accessing the right services or who have run out of options for where to turn to help.
- Our Rough Sleep Outreach Worker works with individuals by supporting, advocating and signposting to address their exclusion and take the next steps in their life.
- Beneficiaries will sign up to the various Skills for Life courses and sports activities, leading to increased confidence and self-esteem.

We will therefore achieve the following objectives;

- 2,000 visitors will come to our Friday Night Meeting, enabling us to provide free healthy meals and support to move away from homelessness.
- 250 rough sleepers will receive a safe place to sleep through our Nightshelter and all will receive a hot meal, clean clothes, a shower and dedicated support to address their homelessness.
- Up to 40 beneficiaries each year will receive support in Barton House (our 14 bed move-on hostel) where individuals can stay for up to 2 years to work through the issues that led to their homelessness with the help of designated support workers.
- At least 100 clients will attend our courses and will enhance their employability skills, gain confidence, self-esteem and develop teambuilding skills.
- Homeless clients will be placed into work placements, significantly improving their prospects for paid employment.
- Beneficiaries will feel a sense of self-value, have a much greater chance of sustaining tenancies and will more easily be able to integrate into society.

The success of this project will be measured in the following ways:

- We keep a record of how many people attend our services and receive meals each week.
- We will monitor client referrals to external services and will monitor the uptake of these, whilst working with partners to improve accessibility.
- Our Rough Sleeper Outreach Worker will measure success through client feedback, move on rates, feedback from other organisations and by recording a breakdown of clients they work with.
- We will implement the Outcome Star for clients on our courses. This highlights 'distance travelled' and helps clients evaluate their skills, competencies and progress over time. This helps clients to identify and understand change, enabling them to celebrate success and understand which areas need development.
- We monitor attendances on our courses through course registers. We will also assess clients on skills based courses and provide certification for accredited courses.
- We will keep work placement logs for each client on a work placement to monitor the success of their placement. We will also monitor placements regularly and will request formal feedback at least every six months to ensure success.
- We receive feedback from clients, volunteers and other stakeholders, to understand the success and to implement future improvements.

We partially provide a statutory service which contributes towards some of the expenditure for our Nightshelter and Barton House. This contributes towards staff salaries, staff operational costs and office support. We complement this work by providing additional charitable support which includes healthy food, games and a range of activities. We also provide our Pathways to Employment courses, Friday Night Meeting and Move on Housing which is purely charitable.

We work in partnership throughout the voluntary and statutory sectors to provide a coordinated approach to address homelessness and exclusion. We are the only provider of a Nightshelter in Bedford and our services are often at full capacity, meeting a need that is too great for one provider to meet alone. This includes:

Chairing the 'Bedfordshire Supported Housing Forum', an independent Multi-agency forum to provide a coordinated approach to reducing homelessness, addressing needs and sharing best practice.

Offering our Pathways to Employment programme to clients of all other projects supporting the homeless.

Working alongside Pre Bend Day Centre who complement our Nightshelter by providing daytime support and food to clients.

We have also worked alongside Noah Enterprise who provided outreach work to the homeless, however recent funding cuts now mean that we are the only provider of this service in Bedford.

Working alongside the Salvation Army who provide shelter to residents on cold nights who cannot stay in our Nightshelter due to capacity reasons. We also provide courses in their centre to support more homeless clients.

Working alongside Amicus Trust, YMCA Bedfordshire and Emmaus to both refer clients and receive referrals for clients who cannot be supported.

This enables us to innovatively respond to emerging challenges. We have therefore set up a refugee support fund for displaced Syrian Refugees and are beginning to support those with no recourse to public funds (45% of the total rough sleeper count).

How do you know that there is a need for your work/activity?Tell us how you have identified there is a need for your service or activity, giving details of any research, surveys or consultation you have undertaken or evidence of current demand.

"In England, more than 81,000 households were found to be homeless during 2013/14" (DCLG, 2014).Locally, the rough sleeper count in Bedford is higher than it's ever been, increasing from 26 to 51 last year. This combined with an increase in demand for our services, led to a record 500 clients being supported last year. This includes rough sleepers, homeless beneficiaries, people struggling with addictions, ex-offenders, the unemployed and soon, refugees. As a result of providing our range of holistic support services we are able to develop relationships with our beneficiaries, providing hope and dedicated support. This is important as the 'Places of Change' agenda has encouraged homelessness services to focus on moving service users forward, including improving their access to meaningful occupation and employment opportunities. Our Friday Night Meeting and other projects enable us to provide

the highly important missing elements for homeless/vulnerable individuals by way of "security, privacy, and links to a community and support network" (Shelter, 2015).

Our aim is to see homeless clients back into independent accommodation and employment, and confident in basic life-skills, thus preventing recurring homelessness (Homeless Link, 2015).

The number of people accessing our services is the highest we have ever seen, and we firmly believe that assisting our clients into paid employment is the long-term solution to enhanced self-esteem, personal accommodation, and ending the cycle of homelessness. It is our mission to see lives restored and making it possible for those who have experienced difficulties to get back on their feet, whether that is rough-sleepers, ex-offenders or simply those who have fallen on hard times. We believe that what we have to offer is unique, carries excellent success rates, and our bespoke training courses are meeting a critical need in Bedford not being met by any other agencies or local authorities.

Please show here how your work/activity will assist in supporting the Council's Sustainable Community Plan priorities:

The project will have an impact upon all the priorities highlighted within the Council's Sustainable Community Plan. I will address this against each priority:

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT, REGENERATION & ENTERPRISE:

Clients will receive access to our Pathways to Employment programme which has already seen over 50% of clients who have completed a work placement, move into employment. As a result of the support we provide, we have seen clients move on to set up their own businesses including car mechanics, bakeries and recycling. Your support will enable individuals who have fallen upon hard times, receive the support to address the barriers to participation and achieve their aspirations.

ENVIRONMENT AND CLIMATE CHANGE:

This project brings together clients into a safe, welcoming environment. To achieve this, we work together with local supermarkets to receive surplus food which reduces waste considerably. Providing food in an indoor environment for homeless clients enables us to use food efficiently, dispose of waste correctly and recycle wherever possible.

ADULT HEALTH AND WELLBEING:

A recent health audit survey from Homeless Link (2014) highlights the negative health impact as a result of homelessness. This includes 73% of homeless people reporting physical health problems, 80% experiencing a mental health issue and 35% not eating at least two meals a day. This project will enable us to address these issues by developing community, building friendships, providing healthy nutritious meals and providing access to health facilities. Our Nightshelter in particular, provides opportunities for members of the homeless community to receive a drop in from a local GP.

CHILDREN AND YOUNG PEOPLE

Our services are open to young people over the age of 18 and support a considerable number of people under 25 years old. Our Nightshelter last year supported 10.4% of this client group and our Pathways to Employment programme supported 44%. Our Friday Night Meeting programme also supports many parents

with young children. Our support enables us to engage with young people or parents, enabling us to provide support to make good decisions, care for others and live independently.

SAFER COMMUNITIES

King's Arms Project believes in the strength of community: that no one should face homelessness alone and that wider society is part of the solution. This project is therefore supported by over 40 different volunteers and a wide range of business partners. We have seen clients go onto to become pioneers of social development and champions of the community. This includes clients who have gone on to set up their own businesses, and others who lead support services for the homeless in Bedford. We believe in building people into a community where they feel safe and are resourced to contribute. We believe that we all have a role to play and that we must stand against poverty together. We believe that this is an important component for building confident communities and ensuring that those going through rough times have a place to meet friends and find a listening ear. This has a positive impact upon breaking the cycle of crime by developing safer communities, providing opportunities for training and qualification, and finding a way out of poverty.

SUSTAINABLE COMMUNITIES

This Project will enable us to address the support and accommodation needs of our clients, with the aim for them to be financially independent and within accommodation of their own. We have seen 84% of clients from our move on housing project move into employment and have seen countless others moving into jobs.

How does your request for a grant from public funds represent value for money for council tax payers?

This project provides excellent value for money due to the high numbers of volunteers involved (over 40), excess food donations which reduces our food bill considerably and economies of scale which enables us to provide each meal for an average of £1.09.

How does your work help to support the council to promote equality and tackle discrimination and the new public sector duties?

ELIMINATE DISCRIMINATION

Cross cultural friendships will develop and an understanding across different backgrounds will be bridged. We will treat everyone fairly and believe that everyone deserves equal opportunities. As a result of bring such a wide client group together, understanding is increased as is an awareness of the different challenges that are experienced.

ADVANCE EQUALITY OF OPPORTUNITY

We believe that there is no such thing as a hopeless case; that no one is too entrenched in poverty of any kind that they are beyond help. Throughout our work, we ensure that nobody faces homeless alone and that wider society is part of the solution. We believe in providing opportunity; that everyone deserves the chance to advance themselves and see their dreams realised. To this end, so far we have seen 56% of people rough sleeping directly move into their own accommodation. We have also seen 50% of our Pathways to Employment volunteer placement clients move into employment of their own. We will continue to advocate and support our clients to access these opportunities.

FOSTER GOOD RELATIONS

This project brings together clients and volunteers from a wide range of ages and ethnic backgrounds. Throughout this, we have seen cross cultural/generational friendships develop and support networks increase. This has also led to previous clients moving on to volunteer with us, which also provides hope and an informed approach to addressing challenges.

The total cost of providing our services over the next year is £984,777. We have already secured £860,911 of this total, leading to a shortfall of £123,866. This includes grants (including amongst others Henry Smith Charity, Lloyds Bank Foundation and Natwest), regular donors, events and income for the housing support that we provide. We have a number of events planned for the remainder of the year, along with further grant applications planned and we will also be relaunching our regular giver campaign.
